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## California Members Issue Statements on Water Negotiations

*Washington, DC* – Today, California Members of the House of Representatives released a timeline outlining water negotiations between the House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate dating back to 2011. In addition, Members issued statements regarding their ongoing, years-long efforts to alleviate the impacts of California's drought.

#### Negotiation Timeline

2011

- H.R. 1837 the *Sacramento-San Joaquin Valley Water Reliability Act* is introduced in the House. The bill would roll back government restrictions on the pumping of water for use by California communities and would ease regulations that result in hundreds of billions of gallons of fresh water getting flushed out into the ocean.

2012

- The House passes H.R. 1837.
- The Senate, with a Democratic majority, does not consider H.R. 1837 or pass its own water bill.

2014

- The House introduces and passes H.R. 3964, the *Sacramento-San Joaquin Emergency Water Delivery Act*, another attempt to ease government water regulations that restrict the water supply.
- Senator Feinstein introduces S. 2016, the *California Emergency Drought Relief Act*, which would provide far less water for California families than H.R. 3964.
- Senator Feinstein then pushes House Republicans to instruct Senate Republicans to allow passage of a second bill, the *Emergency Drought Relief Act of 2014*, S. 2198, which allowed the two Chambers to enter a negotiating conference.
- House members and Senators begin talks on a compromise water bill, but Senator Feinstein walks away from the negotiations shortly before Congress adjourns
- The House quickly passes H.R. 5781, the *California Emergency Drought Relief Act of 2014*, that reflects negotiated language with Senator Feinstein.
- Senators Boxer and Feinstein block H.R. 5781 from being included in an omnibus spending bill.

2015

- The House introduces and passes H.R. 2898, the *Western Water and American Food Security Act of 2015*, which reflects the 2014 negotiations with the Senate.
- The Senate introduces a water bill that spends \$1.3 billion without an offset, meaning it has no chance of passing either chamber.
- House-Senate negotiators meet for several months and make progress toward an agreement.
- The House submits language to include in an omnibus spending bill that retains Democrat priorities as well as Republican priorities that the Obama Administration had largely agreed not to oppose.
- Senator Feinstein publically rejects the proposal less than 24 hours after the proposal is made privately.

Individual statements from members of the California Delegation are below:

**Leader Kevin McCarthy (CA-23)**

“The current drought and water crisis demands a response. The California Republican delegation has put forth a proposal to provide our communities immediate relief as El Nino is likely to bring a wetter than usual winter. Continued opposition from California Democrats in Congress to any solution that is designed to allow more water to flow to central and southern California only exacerbates the current drought and hurts our state. The response from Senator Feinstein and Senator Boxer is disappointing given our proposal’s inclusion of many California Democrat priorities but unfortunately not surprising as they have opposed every legislative effort to find bipartisan agreement. The stakes are too high not to act.”

**Congressman Ken Calvert (CA-42)**

“One of our top priorities throughout these negotiations was to create flexibility in the operation of the pumps in the Delta in order to capture as much water as possible during the upcoming rainy season (El Niño). After many lengthy discussions with the Senate, the Administration, conservation groups, water districts throughout the state, and other interested stakeholders, we

arrived at a compromise that would have provided some relief to the drought-stricken communities of California. The language that was proposed did not violate the Endangered Species Act or the biological opinions; a view that was shared by the Administration. We entered into good faith omnibus negotiations at Senator Feinstein's *request*. The deal was close to done but unfortunately, Senator Feinstein took umbrage to what was at most a staffer error in a closed-door meeting. Our 14 California Republican members remained hopeful, and quiet, until the 11<sup>th</sup> hour trying to resolve small differences with a bipartisan coalition to help the state of California. Our good faith negotiations came to naught. It's unfortunate when the LA Times gets the story wrong, but it is tragic when the Senate gets the policy wrong."

**Congressman David G. Valadao (CA-21)**

"The House of Representatives has repeatedly tried to provide a federal solution to drought conditions impacting our constituents. However, our Senators from California have failed to get a single piece of legislation, even vaguely related to the drought, passed in the Senate this year. To no avail, the House has exhausted all legislative resources. My House-passed bill, H.R. 2898, the *Western Water and American Food Security Act* remains in the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources pending further action. The House of Representatives looks forward to the Senate passing legislation so that the two Chambers may go to Conference to reconcile differences between the Chambers."

**Congressman Devin Nunes (CA-22)**

"The House has proposed a compromise to ease the California water crisis -- one that satisfies the Senate's demands -- and once again Senate Democrats are rejecting our efforts by prioritizing fish over families. If anyone still wonders why Congress has not approved pumping more water for California communities, they should look at the Senate's inexplicable refusal to take yes for an answer."

**Congressman Jeff Denham (CA-10)**

"While Californians suffer through a horrific drought, our senators continue to request secret negotiations only to stall the process. More storage equals jobs. I will settle for nothing less."

**Congressman Paul Cook (CA-08)**

"California is facing the worst drought in a century. California Republicans have been trying for weeks to work with the administration and our California Senators on a drought bill to bring relief to California and capitalize on the upcoming El Niño season. The time to act is now and I urge our California Senators to join us in getting a water deal done."

**Congressman Tom McClintock (CA-04)**

"For many critical months, House Republicans have negotiated in good faith with Congressional Democrats led by Senator Feinstein for a water policy that balanced the desperate needs of the people of California with the demands of the environmental Left. The events of the last week make it obvious that neither she nor the Democratic delegation has been dealing in good faith and that their plan from the outset is to run out the legislative clock. Droughts are nature's fault, but water shortages are a public policy choice. And regrettably, the Democrats continue to choose scarcity over abundance."

**Congressman Doug LaMalfa (CA-01)**

“Every aspect of this proposal was developed by a working group of California’s Republican and Democratic members of the House and Senate, in cooperation with the Obama administration, Governor Brown’s administration, agricultural and urban water districts, environmental groups, and other stakeholders. Any member who claims that they weren’t included has willfully chosen not to be a part of this process and is choosing not to be part of a workable solution to California’s water crisis. The simple facts are that time has run out, that these proposals have received broad, bipartisan, bicameral support, and that the people of California has been waiting for action for three long years.”

**Congresswoman Mimi Walters (CA-45)**

“Finding a solution to California’s drought problem is one of my top priorities and we must seize the opportunity to address this issue immediately. With over 37 million people throughout the state impacted by the drought, it is critical that Congress take action and pass legislation that will provide relief to California’s families, farmers, and businesses. We simply cannot afford to stand by and continue to allow existing policies to mismanage our water resources. I remain committed to working with my colleagues to address this problem.”

**Congressman Stephen Knight (CA-25)**

“California’s water issue will require swift, coordinated action between local, state, and federal agencies. By refusing to act on this measure, Congress will miss a critical opportunity to do its part, which will further hurt California’s families and communities.”

**Congressman Darrell E. Issa (CA-49)**

“The purpose of this drought relief bill is to expeditiously bring water to California communities, which have been suffering from a devastating drought for more than four years. House Republicans have been diligently working with Senator Feinstein for months, crafting a bill ideal for bipartisan and bicameral support. It is disingenuous for someone who has been a critical participant in these discussions to say that the process was secretive. I am hopeful that the Senator can put our communities first and help us bring drought relief to our state as soon as possible.”

## Compromise drought package could move next week

Lawmakers negotiating a Western drought relief package are hopeful they are nearing a compromise bill that could be marked up in the Senate next week.

In a brief interview this afternoon, Sen. Dianne Feinstein (D-Calif.), who has been leading negotiations on the California piece for the upper chamber, said lawmakers are motivated to get something done in time to be included in the end-of-year spending package for the federal government. She said active negotiations with the House are underway.

"We hope to have something that can go to markup -- I think it's next Friday -- and then be included in the omnibus," she said. "You see, for us, if we don't catch the early flows of water, we lose them. So if you get a bill done in the spring, it's too late to be able to hold the water that we need to hold."

Senate Energy and Natural Resources Chairwoman Lisa Murkowski (R-Alaska) confirmed in a separate interview that a markup is in the works for before Thanksgiving recess.

California is now in the fifth year of a record drought that is sending reservoir levels plummeting, forcing deep cuts to deliveries for the state's economically powerful agriculture industry and prompting efficiency measures for cities and suburbs.

The state's lawmakers have spent more than two years trying to put together a relief package that would free up water for central and Southern California. But a deep divide has remained between the House and the Senate, largely over whether and to what extent Endangered Species Act protections should be altered to do so.

With the drought now engulfing vast swaths of the West, Murkowski this year broadened the legislative effort to West-wide legislation, but the divide between California lawmakers in the House and Senate has continued to stymie progress (*E&E Daily*, Oct. 9).

Murkowski said this afternoon that, whatever the avenue to passage, her focus is still on a bill that addresses the entire region's needs.

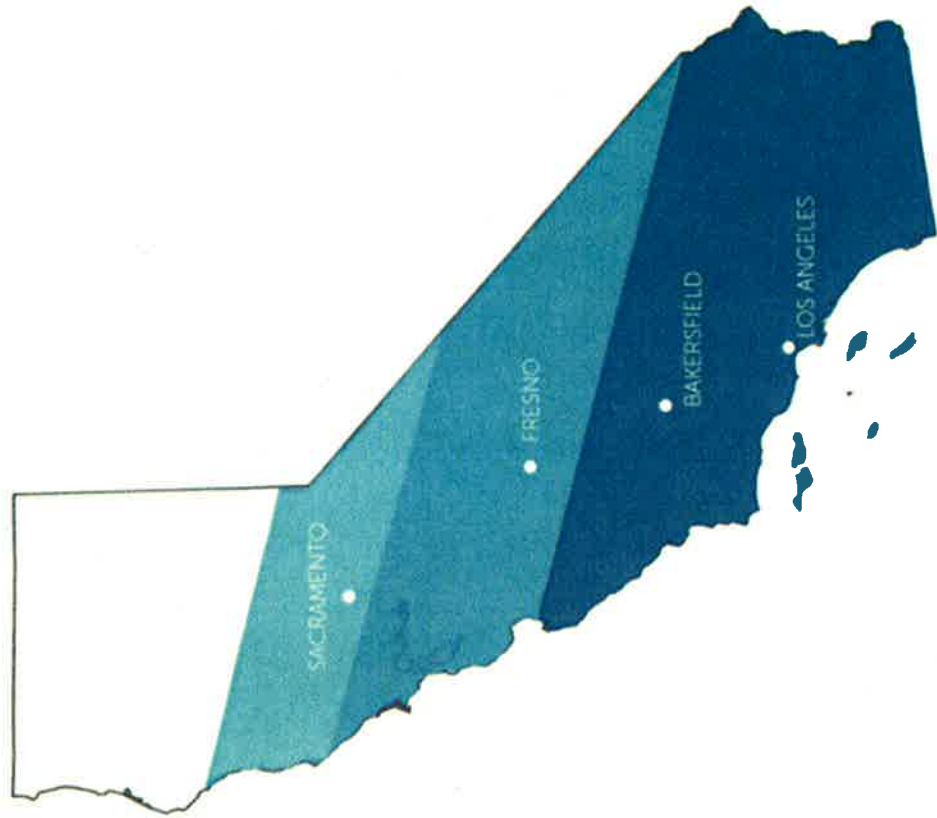
"We have been working to do a broader, West-wide, California, full-meal deal, and that's the push," she said. "I've met with several members of the California delegation -- Sen. [Maria] Cantwell [D-Wash.] and myself -- and all of us are talking about the broader piece, the broader package."

She said she is looking at "all the options" for moving such a package.

California lawmakers have been under pressure from groups representing farmers, cities and other major water users in the West to put aside their differences and find common ground quickly enough for legislation to go into effect for this winter's rainy season (*E&E Daily*, Oct. 28).

Feinstein said this afternoon that, after years of work, the time has come to make a deal real.

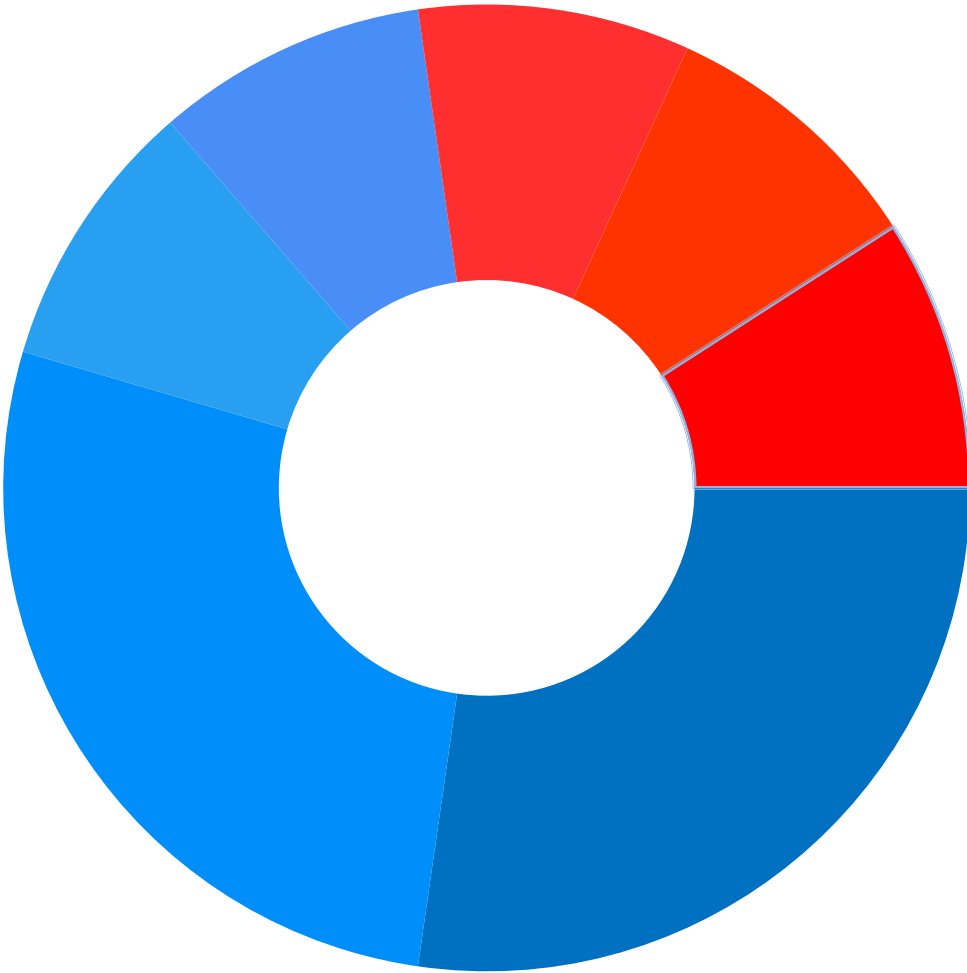
"We have worked and worked and worked; I have people who know this stuff chapter and verse, [who have] met with group after group after group," she said. "But at a certain point you've got to put it together and get it done, and we're at that point."

Senator Feinstein and Leader McCarthy:

We are writing to express our appreciation and ask for your continued efforts to find a legislative solution to the water crisis facing the State of California. The undersigned and your staff, as well as staff from other California delegation offices, have worked tirelessly to develop compromise, common sense legislation that does not amend the Endangered Species Act or existing biological opinions while at the same time creating much needed operational flexibility to provide water for California's families, farms and businesses.

The California drought is a slow moving natural disaster with impacts having been documented by media outlets locally, nationally, and across the globe. The accumulated impacts of the past four years have devastated families, created unlivable conditions in many of the Valley's disadvantaged communities, reduced California's ability to feed the nation and the world, and left local governments with increased demands for social services. Nowhere in the State have the impacts of water supply shortages been more severe than in the Central Valley.

As you know, the lack of snow pack and rainfall are not the only reasons the State has run dangerously low on water. Administrative actions have paralyzed operations of the Central Valley Project and the California State Water Project. These water supply delivery systems have historically been able to supply the State with water, even during extended drought conditions. If legislation to provide clear congressional direction and to create operational flexibility for the State's two major water projects is not enacted this year, the devastation

experienced over the last four years could be extended to a fifth year, even with the El Nino conditions projected for this winter. That is, millions of acre feet of water will be lost, at a time when the people of the state of California need it most.

We need you to act now, through any vehicle possible, to pass legislation that can provide California with relief. You personally have acknowledged the need for action this year. Historically, California's heaviest rainfall occurs from December through March. Legislation must be enacted now to take advantage of those wet months. Waiting to take up the discussions and process again when Congress returns in January will be too late to help in 2016. For these reasons, absent another form of legislation that would be equally effective, we must support inclusion of the compromise, common sense legislation you and others have worked on in the omnibus appropriations bill being considered by both Houses of Congress.

Thank you for your continued leadership and dedication to find common sense solutions that are required to sustain the people and the economy of the State of California.

Dear Senators and Representatives,

I am writing to ask that you necessitate immediate action in Congress to address California's dire water crisis. As you know, California is experiencing a persistent, catastrophic drought, and one of the driest years on record since 1895. This is negatively affecting communities, families, the environment, and industries statewide.

Many communities are depleting their existing water supplies or simply running out of water altogether, as we have seen in some Central Valley regions. The extent of the drought has also resulted in unprecedented water rationing orders designed to stretch our already limited supplies into the future and first-of-their-kind groundwater regulations in our state. California's water

situation remains bleak; however, I believe that opportunity still exists to give our state a fighting chance.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), predicts the current El Nino in the Pacific Ocean has a 95% chance of continuing through the 2015-2016 winter, and further states that current atmospheric conditions indicate this could be a strong El Nino, bringing heavy and much-needed precipitation to our drought-parched state, in northern, central, and southern California. Therefore, the time to act is now.

In addition, NOAA Climate Prediction Center (CPC) data shows there is a 66% chance that El Nino could bring normal to above normal precipitation this winter in northern California, where rain and snow feed critical reservoirs that supply water to the rest of our state. CPC data also shows upwards of a 93% chance of normal to above average precipitation for the rest of the state. This precipitation would likely peak in the first quarter of 2016. This El Nino-related precipitation will provide the desperately needed water that is crucial for our struggling constituents.

In an effort to capture as much precipitation from these rare El Nino conditions, we need to act immediately through any means possible to pass legislation to bring California relief. The legislation proposed by Republican Members of California's House Delegation for inclusion in the omnibus appropriations bill is largely the product of an extraordinary bi-partisan effort, negotiated in good faith among Members of the California Delegation with Federal agencies. While arguably not perfect, this legislation is the best vehicle to enact law to avoid disastrous results for millions of Californians.

It is for these reasons that I humbly urge you to support language offered by California House Republicans in the upcoming omnibus appropriations bill, and pass legislation to help get California flowing towards recovery.

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After two years with no water deliveries from the CVP, the farms and communities of the Friant Division are facing another devastatingly dry year. We've already lost many small family-owned citrus farms, and those of us who have managed to hold things together thus far are running out of options. Groundwater supplies and life savings are depleted. A third year without water will mean more farms going under and more unemployment. It means that agriculture on the Eastside of the San Joaquin Valley as we know it today – mostly small family farms – will be ruined. We need you to act NOW to prevent this. We need you to pass legislation this month to ensure that winter CVP operations can make some water available to the Friant Division to help us scrape by for another year in the hope of a better future.

Only Congress – only you, our elected representatives, can help. The Bureau of Reclamation has abandoned the Friant Division, effectively writing off a taxpayer investment that has returned huge benefits to the region and to the Nation for six decades. The federal agencies have turned their backs on our families, our economy, and our future.. We implore you not to do the same.

While we understand and respect the desire to continue to pursue legislation through the standard process, the plain and simple fact is that there isn't enough time for that. Besides, there is nothing in the pending legislative proposals that hasn't been thoroughly examined by Members of Congress of both parties, by federal and state agencies, and by supporters and critics alike. During the past four years, there have been four House and Senate drought bills introduced, two passed by the House, and at least three Congressional hearings on the California drought and drought legislation, including one in the Senate only a few weeks ago. There is little, if anything, to be gained by more process, except delay, we can't afford any more of that.

While the California Delegation has worked hard to overcome partisan and regional differences to find a compromise to maximize water for farms, towns and cities while protecting endangered species, some environmental groups have spent their time loudly and harshly attacking every bill and legislative proposal to increase operational flexibility in the Delta and the CVP. They have been explicit and exceedingly clear that they will oppose ANY drought legislation. Their feigned ignorance of the Delegation's negotiating process and their manufactured outrage at every reasonable idea must be recognized for what they are: a tactic, a ploy, a strategy of intimidation and delay. It worked for them a year ago when the Delegation neared agreement on drought legislation only to stumble at the last minute under a withering barrage of orchestrated attacks. And it appears, to us at least, that the same strategy of fearmongering, intimidation and delay is being employed again now, just when all your hard work is about to pay off. Don't let it succeed.

We are genuinely grateful to each of you for the vast amounts of time and effort that you have invested in negotiations over the past few months and last year. But the time for talk is over. It's time to act.

The legislation proposed by Members California's House Delegation for inclusion in the omnibus appropriations bill is the product of an extraordinary bipartisan effort and good-faith negotiations among Members of the California Delegation and with federal and state agencies. It's not perfect, but don't let perfect be the enemy of the good. Don't let process substitute for action. We urge you; *we beg you* to act now, through any vehicle possible, to pass legislation that can provide some relief to the Friant Division and to California as a whole.

Do the right thing. Please.

We are writing to express our appreciation and ask for your continued efforts to find a legislative solution to the water crisis facing the State of California. You and your staff, as well as staff from other California delegation offices, have worked tirelessly to develop compromise, common sense legislation that does not amend the Endangered Species Act or existing biological opinions while at the same time creating much needed operational flexibility to provide water for California's families, farms and businesses.

The California drought is a slow moving natural disaster with impacts having been documented by media outlets locally, nationally, and across the globe. The accumulated impacts of the past four years have devastated families, created unlivable conditions in many of the Valley's disadvantaged communities, reduced California's ability to feed the nation and the world, and left local governments with increased demands for social services. Nowhere in the State have the impacts of water supply shortages been more severe than in the Central Valley.

As you know, the lack of snow pack and rainfall are not the only reasons the State has run dangerously low on water. Administrative actions have paralyzed operations of the Central Valley Project and the California State Water Project. These water supply delivery systems have historically been able to supply the State with water, even during extended drought conditions. If legislation to provide clear congressional direction and to create operational flexibility for the State's two major water projects is not enacted this year, the devastation experienced over the last four years could be extended to a fifth year, even with the El Nino conditions projected for this winter. That is, millions of acre feet of water will be lost, at a time when the people of the state of California need it most.

We need you to act now, through the FY17 omnibus bill or any vehicle possible, to pass the emergency drought language offered by California House Republicans that can provide California with relief. You personally have acknowledged the need for action this year. Historically, California's heaviest rainfall occurs from December through March. The House proposal must be enacted now to take advantage of those wet months. Waiting to take up the discussions and process again when Congress returns in January will be too late to help in 2016. For these reasons, absent another form of legislation that would be equally effective, we must support inclusion of the House proposal in the omnibus appropriations bill being considered by both Houses of Congress.



**Sec. 1. Title, Table of Contents, Findings**

- *Origination:* House
- *Authorization:* None
- *Summary:* California Emergency Drought Relief and Water Storage Act of 2015; Includes finding on water gap.

**Sec. 2. Emergency Operations**

- *Origination:* Senate & House
- *Authorization:* None
- *Summary:* Requires the Secretaries to provide maximum amount of water to CVP & SWP contractors by approving temporary operations or projects as quickly as possible, including: keeping the Cross Channel Gates open for the maximum extent possible, implement turbidity control measures to for smelt to increase water supplies; expand water transfers windows and shorten approval timing; and creates a process for the governor of a state to request that the Feds implement the emergency authorities under this subsection to approve projects to provide emergency water supplies or address the drought.

**Sec. 3. Actions to Benefit Fish**

- *Origination:* Senate (with House modifications)
- *Authorization:* \$21M
- *Summary:* Requires the agencies to take various actions to benefit fish, such as gravel & rearing area additions on the Sacramento River, improvements to fish passages, trap & barge programs, etc.

**Sec. 4. Scientifically supported implementation of OMR flow requirements**

- *Authorization:* None
- *Summary:* Requires pumping to occur at -5,000 CFS. Authorizes a reduction in pumping only if there are no additional adverse impacts to listed species beyond the range of effects anticipated to occur to the listed species for the duration of the biological opinions; prohibits the Secretaries from initiating re-consultation unless there are additional adverse impacts to listed species beyond the range of effects anticipated to occur to the listed species for the duration of the biological opinions.

**Sec. 5. Temporary operational flexibility for first few storms of the water year.**

- *Origination:* House (with significant modifications)
- *Authorization:* None

- Summary: Under certain conditions, the Secretaries are authorized to pump at rates more negative than -5,000 CFS to capture water during the first few storms of the water year provided there are no no additional adverse impacts to listed species beyond the range of effects anticipated to occur to the listed species for the duration of the biological opinions; prohibits the Secretaries from initiating re-consultation unless there are additional adverse impacts to listed species beyond the range of effects anticipated to occur to the listed species for the duration of the biological opinions.

- Summary: Requires the Bureau of Reclamation to finish the five CALFED feasibility studies for the Shasta, Sites, Los Vaqueros, Temperance Flat, and San Luis Reservoir dam projects by the deadlines prescribed in this section; requires the Secretary of the Interior to prioritize water supply benefits from Temperance Flat when determining feasibility; requires the Secretary to testify before Congress if the Interior Department fails to finish the CALFED feasibility studies by the date prescribed in this section.

#### Sec. 9. Losses Caused by Construction and Operation of Water Storage Projects

- Origination: House – new material
- Authorization: None
- Summary: This language repeats and clarifies existing law regarding private property adversely impacted by construction or raising of various dams.

#### Sec. 10. Assistance for Drought Stricken Communities

- Origination: Senate
- Authorization: \$15M
- Summary: Creates a grant program to help drought stricken communities with

a population between 10,000 and 60,000 to fund various activities to increase water supply, like wastewater, point of use, point of treatment, distribution facilities, connection feeds, and well construction.

Sec. 11. Conservation Fish Hatcheries

- Origination: House (with significant modifications)
- Authorization: None
- Summary: Requires the Secretaries in two years to establish expanded use of conservation fish hatcheries for Delta smelt and listed salmonid species to minimize water supply reductions to CVP and SWP contractors and for the benefit of listed species; authorizes the Secretaries to enter into agreements with other entities to establish and promote conservation fish hatcheries for Delta smelt and listed salmonid species.

Sec. 12. Non-federal program to protect native anadromous fish in the Stanislaus River.

- Origination: House
- Authorization: None
- Summary: Authorizes a pilot fish predatory suppression program on the Stanislaus River for the benefits of listed salmonid species.

Sec. 13. Pilot program to implement CALFED invasive species program

- Origination: House
- Authorization: None
- Summary: Requires that predator fish suppression programs authorized in P.L. 108-361 (CALFED) to begin to be implemented in the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta.

Sec. 14. Additional storage at New Melones

- Authorization: None
- Origination: House
- Summary: Directs the Bureau of Reclamation to work with water districts within the Stanislaus River basin to increase available storage for conservation, conjunctive use, transfers, and rescheduled water projects for maximum storage in New Melones Reservoir.

Sec. 15. Reauthorization of the Desalination Act

- Authorization: \$100M
- Origination: Senate
- Summary: Reauthorizes the Desalination Act; increases the annual authorization from \$5M to \$10M for 5 years for research grants; authorizes \$50M for 5 years for construction grants.

Sec. 16. New water recycling and reuse projects

- Authorization: \$200M

- Origination: Senate
- Summary: Expands Title XVI by creating a new water recycling grant Program; authorizes \$200 for this new grant program.

Sec. 17. Accelerated revenue, repayment, and surface water storage enhancement.

- Authorization: \$721M (offset)
- Origination: House
- Summary: Allows water agencies to pre-pay certain Federal debt; based on prior law enacted by the Democrats.

Sec. 18. Deauthorization of inactive projects

- Authorization: \$250M (offset)
- Origination: Senate - new material
- Summary: Creates a process to de-authorize old Bureau of Reclamation projects.

Sec. 19. Compliance with Endangered Species Act

- Authorization: None
- Origination: House – new material
- Summary: States that nothing in this bill shall or be construed to modify the Endangered Species Act.

Sec. 20. Sunset

- Authorization: None
- Origination: New Material
- Summary: The entire bill expires in five years except for Sections 17 and 18.
